Abstract

Historical explanation, along with quantitative, ethnographic, and experimental, are one of the "four main methods of addressing causal questions in social science (Stinchcombe, 2005)." Recent special issues in leading management journals that focus on the use of historical methods are a testament to the renewed attention that history is receiving from the management research community. However, despite these promising developments, even though Strategy scholars admit that 'History Matters', there remains significant ambiguity about how scholars can engage with history to produce knowledge that is generally recognised as contributing to the broader field of Strategic Management. The purpose of this workshop is to have an open discussion about how history can be used effectively in Strategy studies.
